NRA GUN SAFETY RULES

At the NRA, firearm education and safety is paramount - that's why we offer a variety of programs and services to promote the safe handling, use and storage of firearms. Whether you're a parent in search of information about firearm safety in the home, a first-time gun owner, or an old pro looking to brush up on your firearm handling skills, the NRA is here to keep you and your family safe. Explore NRA's fundamental rules of gun safety, as well as information how to safely store a gun and good cleaning practices.

The fundamental NRA rules for safe gun handling are:



**ALWAYS Keep The Gun Pointed
In A Safe Direction**

This is the primary rule of gun safety. Common sense dictates the safest direction, depending on different circumstances.



**ALWAYS Keep Your Finger Off
The Trigger Until Ready To Shoot**

When holding a gun, rest your finger alongside the frame and outside the trigger guard. Until you are actually ready to fire, do not touch the trigger.



**ALWAYS Keep The Gun Unloaded
Until Ready To Use**

If you do not know how to open the action or inspect the chamber(s), leave the gun alone and get help from someone who does.

When using or storing a gun, always follow these additional NRA rules:

- Know your target and what is beyond.
- Know how to use the gun safely.
- Be sure the gun is safe to operate.
- Use only the correct ammunition for your gun.
- Wear eye and ear protection as appropriate.
- Never use alcohol, over-the-counter drugs or prescription drugs before or while shooting.
- Store guns so they are not accessible to unauthorized persons.
- Additional Safety Precautions.
- Cleaning.

WELCOME TO THE OKLAHOMA CITY GUN CLUB

Incorporated in 1958, the Oklahoma City Gun Club has long served the local community by providing supervised facilities for firearms shooting, giving instruction in the safe handling and proper care of firearms, teaching better marksmanship, and hosting numerous competitions that are open to the public. Over the past sixty years, the Oklahoma City Gun Club has grown to approximately 2,600 members and over 20 active shooting divisions, encompassing a broad range of the shooting disciplines. We work closely with many organizations and associations to support the shooting sports and to promote involvement, awareness, and safety.



The Oklahoma City Gun Club is located east of Edmond and about 3 miles north of Arcadia, OK. Although a private club, the Oklahoma City Gun Club regularly hosts events open to the public.

The Oklahoma City Gun Club is dedicated to providing the community with a safe, comprehensive environment to enjoy a broad range of shooting sports. Our goal is to increase the community's awareness of the proper care and handling of firearms, spread interest in an enthusiasm for each of the shooting disciplines, and to ensure the

continuation of our shooting rights and heritage through involvement with programs for the community, including juniors, women, military, law enforcement, family, and friends.

The Oklahoma City Gun Club is affiliated with many organizations and hosts a number of regional and national events, drawing shooters from around the country. A few examples include:

- The Cowboy Action Division hosts The SASS National Championship with 700 shooters. From 47 states which is the largest Cowboy Action Shooting competition in the world. The division holds regular monthly matches.
- State and regional Handgun Silhouette Championships have been hosted here for the last 36 years. The club has also hosted an International championship all in the same year with 5 different countries involved, Australia, Brazil, Paraguay, Canada as well as the USA
- Action Pistol consistently hosts some of the largest monthly USPSA matches in the nation as well as Sectional Championships. We shoot USPSA, Steel Challenge, GSSF, Shoot Sig, ICORE, 3-Gun, Practical Rifle & Bowling Pin matches.
- For the last 20+ years, the Club has hosted the Women on Target Instructional Clinic, an NRA-sponsored program drawing women from the surrounding states - and a consistent sell-out.
- NRA Lever Action division holds a three-day Regional match each year in September, typically hosting 50 to 60 competitors, all shooting three disciplines of lever action rifle, as well as monthly matches the second Saturday, March to October.
- The High Power Division conducts State Championships, NRA Regionals, the NRA National Mid-Range Matches, and informal practice sessions using a contemporary electronic target system, shooting from 100 to 1,000 yards.

Although the Oklahoma City Gun Club is a private club, most events are open to the public. Competitions are open to the public and typically occur between April and October, especially on the weekends. In addition, the Oklahoma City Gun Club has many shooting divisions that hold matches year round.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- If you are on a range, hearing and eye protection is always mandatory for all participants and guests.
- Oklahoma City Gun Club badges are to be worn at all times.

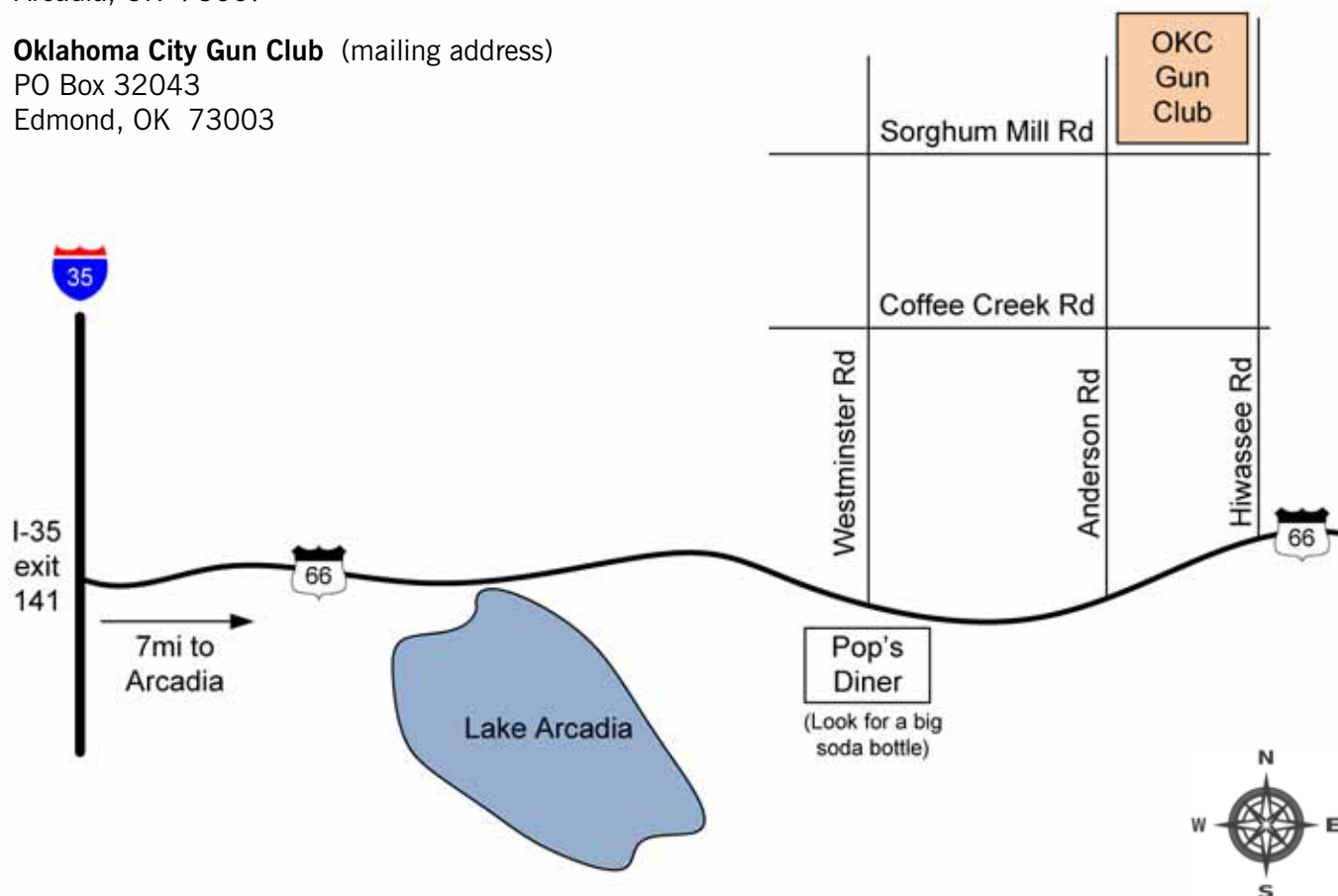

The Range is located north of the town of Arcadia, east of Edmond. From I-35, take Exit 141, which is the old route 66 eastbound. Arcadia is approximately 7 miles.

Just past the middle of the town is a left turn for Anderson Road. You may also continue further east beyond Arcadia for another mile to Hiwassee Road and turn left. Both roads work; the difference is more a matter of which entrance to the Club you are looking for. Action Pistol, Cowboy, Blackpowder, and Shotgun are closest via Hiwassee. The main club entrance and other ranges are closest to the Anderson Road entrance.

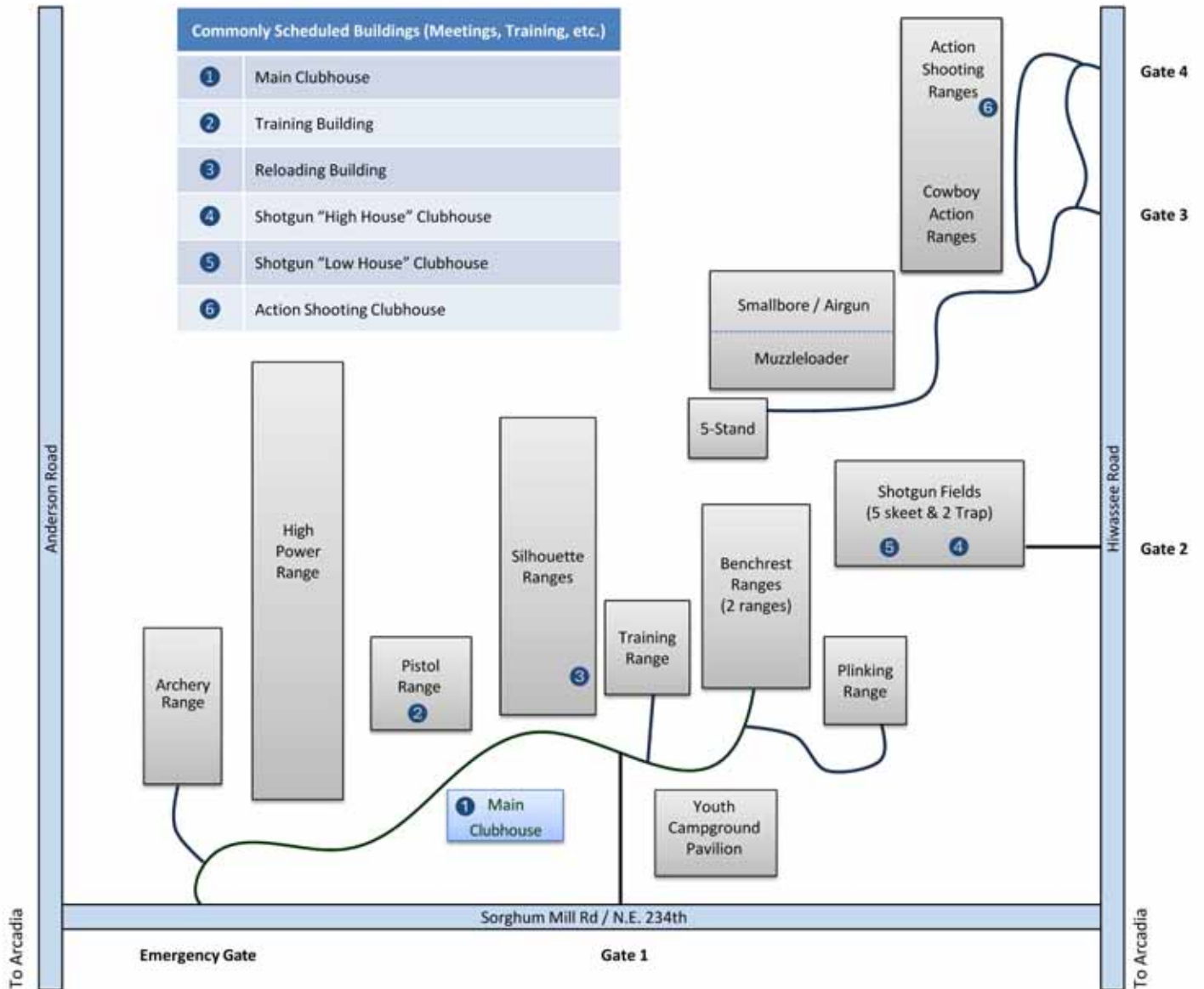
In either case, proceed northbound for approximately 3 miles until you arrive at Sorghum Mill Road (also marked as NE 234th Street). Then:

- From Anderson Road, turn right and look for the main entrance to the Gun Club about 1/2 mile east on your left.
- From Hiwassee, to reach the main club entrance, turn left onto Sorghum Mill/234th St and look for the main entrance about 1/2 mile on your right.
- For the entrance to Shotgun, Action Pistol, Cowboy Action and Black Powder ranges which are all accessed from Hiwassee, continue beyond the Sorghum Mill/234th Street turnoff and continue northbound. The shotgun area is about 3/10th of a mile on your left, and the Action Pistol, Cowboy, and Black Powder ranges are about 6/10th of a mile on the left.
- NOTE: There is now an additional entrance to the Action Pistol range about 100 yards further north, which is what we use for all IPSC, ICORE, Steel Challenge, and 3-Gun events.

MEMBERSHIP DUES AND WORK DAYS

Membership dues the first year are \$334.40 (\$229.90 annual dues plus a \$104.50 initiation fee). Deadline for dues to be paid is December 31. New members will begin as Associate members. Dues will depend on whether you complete a Work Day during the year. A Work Day can be anything from helping with a match on one of the ranges to cutting brush and mowing. The Gun Club has several scheduled work days during the year and the various Divisions schedule workdays for just their range. You are responsible for making arrangements and completing your workday obligation. Gun Club members receive an \$80.00 credit each year by completing a Work Day.

With current individual membership, Gun Club members are allowed to invite immediate family to participate with them while on the shooting range. Participation requires no additional fee. Family members must be joined by a current Gun Club member and must shoot from the same firing point.

DEADLINE FOR DUES TO BE PAID

December 31 - Dues received after December 31 will be processed as soon as possible but may not be completed by February 1 the following year.

Membership Classifications: There are four (4) classes of membership: Associate, Voting, Silver, and Spouse. Badges include:

1. White: Club Official

2. Red: Associate, Silver, and Spouse

3. Blue: Voting Member

VOTING MEMBER

The Board of Directors implemented revised guidelines (August 2016) as they pertain to new requests to become a Voting Member. The requirements are set out below:

1. Must be a member in good standing for at least three (3) years.
2. Pay a non-refundable fee of \$100.00 upon acceptance.
3. Write a letter to the Board outlining past contributions to the club and future plans and goals.
4. Provide a written endorsement or sponsorship from a club official (board member or division chairman).
5. Appear before the Board if requested to do so.

Our goal is to encourage participation in the Oklahoma City Gun Club (OKCGC) by making a concentrated effort to grant voting rights to those who are truly invested in the gun club. We need Voting Members who are willing to give back to the club and invest their time and energies into making the OKCGC the best it can be. We are an all-volunteer organization and it takes dedicated individuals who are willing to step up and give back.

Written requests for becoming a Voting member can either be emailed to: president@okcgunclub.org or mailed to: OKCGC, PO Box 32043, Edmond, OK 73003. Requests for Voting Membership will be considered periodically throughout the year. In addition, current Voting Members will be expected to vote in our yearly elections. Any Voting members who do not vote in two consecutive elections will be reduced to Associate membership.

GATE COMBINATION

The gate will be changed each year on February 1. Dues must be received by December 31 in order to receive your new badge and gate combination by February 1 each year.

WORK DAYS

Work Days are a great opportunity to volunteer and learn more about each Gun Club Division. If you did a workday and have not been credited for it, do one of two things:

1. Mail in a **COPY** of your signed workday card with your check.
2. Contact the person you did the workday for and ask them to confirm with Carey Pribil by **EMAIL** that you have a workday.
3. Work Day cards must be turned in to the Gun Club by December 1 of each year in order to receive your \$80.00 membership dues credit.

Do not call, email, or write the Oklahoma City Gun Club to contact someone to verify that you have completed your workday. It is the member's responsibility to show proof of the workday.

NRA MEMBERSHIP MUST BE MAINTAINED TO BE A MEMBER OF OKC GUN CLUB

GENERAL RULES OF CONDUCT *Adopted February 1971, Revised November 2025*

These rules supplement the standard NRA Safety Rules that cover safety with firearms. Additional rules pertaining to each specific range will supplement these and the standard NRA rules.

1. This range and associated facilities are for the use of OKLAHOMA CITY GUN CLUB members and their guests only. Members must wear their membership badges at all times while at the range. **If you lose your membership badge, request a replacement by contacting membership@okcgunclub.org.**

To deter non-club members from entering through an open gate and using the club at their leisure, the board has posted "no trespassing" signs at all entrances, a requirement for the prosecution of trespassers.

Please offer gentle reminders to your clubmates to wear their badges prominently, and don't be reluctant to ask a stranger at the club to see his or her badge if not being worn. While we welcome non-members to participate in many of our matches and events, they must remain in the area of the activity while on our property. Non-members are not familiar with our rules and could pose a safety or security risk.

If anyone not wearing a badge offers any resistance when confronted, discretely get a picture of their license plate, and forward the picture, with time, place and other pertinent information to any board member (see page 1). Non-compliant members will have the opportunity to explain their actions at a board meeting, and non-members will be contacted by police.

Thank you for helping make the OKLAHOMA CITY GUN CLUB a safer place for our members and communities.

2. It is the responsibility of the gun owner to stay up-to-date on the latest safety bulletins, recalls and other information pertaining to the firearms and ammunition they bring to the Oklahoma City Gun Club for use and competition.
3. It is the responsibility of the gun owner to ensure that all firearms and ammunition used at the Oklahoma City Gun Club are in good working condition and are safe to use.
4. If there exists doubt about the safety of any firearm or ammunition, the member/user should refrain from using that firearm or ammunition at the Club until a determination is made by the manufacturer, a competent gunsmith or other professional as to the safety of that firearm or ammunition.
5. Each person shooting on these ranges must familiarize themselves with NRA Safety Rules, these General Rules, and the specific rules posted at each range.
6. **GUEST POLICY**
 - a. Members may bring not more than two (2) guests to shoot at the range at any one time, except for members of his immediate family.
 - b. A guest may not shoot on the range more than five (5) times per calendar year. Guests under the age of 18 are exempt from this rule.
 - c. Guests must shoot from the same bench or firing point as their host.
 - d. Guests must obey the rules of the Club, and their safe and courteous conduct is the responsibility of the host member.
 - e. Guest must be accompanied by their host at all times.

GENERAL RULES OF CONDUCT, continued

7. Gates are to be kept closed and locked at all times except during scheduled shooting events. Lock combinations will not be divulged to non-members. All gates have the same combination as well as the bathrooms. The Gun Club is member only but there are a lot of competition shoots open to non-members. If a lock is not there then a chairman of a competition has it with them.
8. When two or more persons are firing on any common firing line, one must act as the Range Safety Officer. Each individual is responsible for the safe handling of his firearms.
9. Each range is to be used only for the purpose for which it is constructed.
 - a. All plinking shall be conducted at the Plinking Range. (NO .22 cal CENTER FIRE!)
 - b. All shots fired on any range must impact the earth backstop.
 - c. During formal matches, the affected ranges are reserved.
10. No guest under the age of eighteen (18) may shoot on any club range unless accompanied by an adult member who is present on the firing line.
11. Each member is responsible for acquainting himself/herself with the location of all Club ranges and danger zones. You must familiarize your guests with these locations. Do not wander from established range, parking, and road area. No one is allowed off the beaten path. There is no hunting or hiking allowed.
12. All motor vehicles will be operated only on the Club roads and shall be parked only in designated parking areas.
13. All members shall police their firing points and target areas and deposit trash in the trash barrels. Please leave the range in better condition than you found it.
14. In the interest of safety, NO HUNTING is allowed on Club property.
15. Violation of any Club rules, irresponsible behavior, or destruction of any OKLAHOMA CITY GUN CLUB property could result in disciplinary action and possible expulsion from the OKLAHOMA CITY GUN CLUB.
16. There will be **no firing of automatic firearms** on the ranges by anyone at any time. This prohibition includes devices that simulate automatic fire including (but not limited to) bump-stocks, binary triggers, forced reset triggers, or any other such devices.
17. **No .50 cal Browning Machine Gun or equivalent is allowed.**
18. All firing is to be conducted from published sunup to sundown. No firing by any kind of artificial light.
19. **NO ALCOHOL** on the firing line or while you are shooting.
20. Tracer rounds or any type of incendiary ammunition is strictly prohibited.
21. Fireworks are PROHIBITED on gun club property.
22. Paint Ball guns are PROHIBITED on gun club property.
23. EYE PROTECTION REQUIRED at all ranges at all times. Hearing protection highly recommended where applicable.
24. **Instructions by individuals on OKC Gun Club Property**

Members will not conduct, contract for, or otherwise arrange for training or instruction on the OKCGC property for a fee or business purposes unless approved by the club's Training Division.

 - *A member of the gun club needs to sponsor the instructor/training.*
 - *The instructor will need to provide a copy of their current liability insurance naming the gun club as a certificate holder.*
 - *There is a \$25 per day range use fee for any non-members attending.*
 - *The training will be open to gun club members and posted on the gun club calendar.*
 - *Once an instructor is approved by the Training Division, then the Training Division will work with the appropriate division to reserve ranges/facilities for them.*
 - *It is acceptable for a gun club division to conduct training or instruction without the training division oversight.*
25. Legally owned suppressors and short barreled rifles are welcome unless prohibited by the rules for a specific range. For example, only handguns are allowed on the pistol range.
26. ** Explosives, explosive targets, armor piercing, incendiary or tracer rounds are prohibited **

INTRODUCTION

The variety of matches within our division has expanded, offering at least one match every weekend of every month throughout the year, and sometimes two. New to action shooting? No problem. Many folks come to watch a match and listen in on our pre-match briefings; hearing and eye protection is required.

Though this is not the venue to learn how to operate your firearm, it is an excellent environment to improve your skill and comfort using your firearm under the pressure of time and competition. While competitors of varied skill categories and classifications shoot together, scores are ultimately sorted out by firearm divisions and shooter skill level. This allows shooters of all abilities to share experiences, shooting styles, and strategy.

While the specific rules, equipment configuration and shooter experience vary among the different matches, there is something for everyone. We always have at least a few first-time shooters at our matches so don't feel like you will be the only one; just let us know when you check in so we can give you some extra help. We provide a new competitor briefing before every match and will do everything we can to see that your experience is safe and enjoyable.

If you would like reminders about our division events, email ipsc.mail@okcgunclub.org and we will add you to the mailing list. Generally, we send out match reminders the Sunday or Monday beforehand, complete with a link to pre-register. While registering ahead of time is not mandatory, it helps us get the match underway in a timely manner.

For more information about our match formats and rules, visit the Action Shooting Division on our website. Always check the online calendar for last minute match updates, especially if there is any concern about weather on match day.

In addition to our regular monthly matches, we typically host several state and regional matches. Check our website and online calendar for details as they become available.



ACTION SHOOTING DIVISION, continued

REGULAR MATCHES

USPSA – 1st Saturday of the month: “Run & Gun” Practical shooting that engages dynamic and challenging courses of fire, where speed, accuracy, and power are tested. Whether you're a seasoned shooter or new to the sport, USPSA offers a structured, exciting path to elevate your shooting skills in a supportive environment.

GSSF & Shoot Sig – 2nd Saturday of the month: GSSF and Shoot SIG style matches are being held on alternating second Saturdays of the month through the year.

- GSSF style matches are set up and run like an outdoor Glock match and will have five divisions, Stock, Unlimited, Rimfire Pistol, Pocket and PCC. The major difference is you can shoot any centerfire pistol OR rimfire pistol you want, as this IS NOT a GSSF sanctioned event.
- Shoot SIG style matches are set up and run like an outdoor Shoot SIG match and will have six divisions: Sig Pistol Iron, Sig Pistol Optics, 365 Iron, 365 Optic, Sig PCC, and P322. The major difference is you can shoot any centerfire pistol, rimfire pistol, or PCC you want, as this IS NOT a Shoot SIG sanctioned event. We'll help you figure out which division best fits your equipment.

3-Gun – 2nd Saturday of every other month: A fast-growing segment of our sport is 3-Gun which is basically USPSA with handguns, rifle, and shotgun – sometimes all 3 on a given stage. 3-Gun matches involve a lot of equipment and ammunition. There are several equipment divisions. A wagon, range cart, or something of that sort is highly recommended.

Steel Challenge – 3rd Saturday of the month: Steel Challenge matches recognize many different pistol caliber equipment categories including .22rimfire divisions. Whether you come out and watch a match or 'jump right in' like most of us have, Steel Challenge is an exciting shooting discipline that combines speed and accuracy in a fun format that can be enjoyed by almost anyone at any level of experience. With all of the shooting done from within a 3-foot square box, simpler equipment requirements and recognition of .22 rimfire, Steel Challenge is an excellent way to get involved in the action shooting sports – especially for introducing our youth.

ICORE – 3rd Saturday of every other month: ICORE (International Confederation of Revolver Enthusiasts), is an “Action” shooting competition where the equipment and course design rules are specifically written for revolver shooters. Match format is much like USPSA competition. The principle differences are that the equipment is limited to revolvers of 32 magnum calibers or larger and that all courses of fire must be designed to be six rounds neutral.

Practical Rifle – 4th Saturday of the month: Interested in “run & gun” action with your rifle? This is for you. Essentially, USPSA match format and administration but rifle only and simpler scoring methods. Divisions include Rimfire, Light Carbines, Pistol Caliber Carbines (PCC), and Battle Rifle. This is meant to be safe, fast, fun, and very easy for anyone that has shot 3-Gun or USPSA to step right into, but we will do a shooter briefing before the match begins.

Bowling Pin – 5th Saturday of the month (where there is one): Test your mettle in a head-to-head tournament with cash prizes for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place plus random cash prizes depending on the number of entries. Use the 1st round to warm-up round without fear of elimination. Subsequently, it is single elimination, but losers of the 2nd round may buy a mulligan before the 2nd round ends to continue to the 3rd round.



ACTION SHOOTING DIVISION, continued

Pairs of competitors will face off against one another in timed, 30-second bouts with unlimited round count. The first to knock all 5 bowling pins completely off their respective platform wins. Ties will be decided first by most pins knocked off, and second, by most pins knocked over. The divisions are handgun, rimfire and PCC/Race gun – something for everyone.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Matches take a lot of work to set up and run. Help is always appreciated; if you can, arrive a little early and offer to help set-up, or stay a little afterward and help break down. During the matches competitors are expected to help. After the range is declared clear by the Range Officer, everyone should help pick up brass, tape targets, reset steel targets, etc. Just a little effort by everyone makes it go much smoother and everyone has a better time.



ACTION SHOOTING DIVISION, continued

ACTION SHOOTING RANGE RULES (NORTH 6 BAYS)

1. Read and obey range rules while using this range. You are responsible for knowing these rules! Contact club official at OKCGC_Action@OKCGunclub.org if clarification is needed or to report maintenance issues.
2. Safety is paramount in all activities conducted on this range.
 - **ALWAYS** keep firearm pointed in a safe direction
 - **ALWAYS** keep your finger off the trigger until you are ready to fire
 - **ALWAYS** keep your firearm unloaded until ready to use
3. When two or more people are utilizing a bay, one must act as Range Safety Officer.
4. NEVER handle Firearm while someone is downrange. Usage of empty chamber flags is highly encouraged.
5. All firearms shall be transported in a bag/case or with the muzzle straight up or straight down to and from the shooting bays. DO NOT POINT ANY FIREARMS AT ANYONE ON THE RANGE AT ANY TIME. The only place you may handle your firearm is while fully within the shooting bays or at one of the designated safe areas. ABSOLUTELY NO HANDLING OF FIREARMS IN THE PARKING LOT.
6. Do not load your firearm until you are fully within the confines of a shooting bay.
7. All shooting must be done from within the confines of a shooting bay.
8. All rounds must impact the earthen berms – no firing shall ever be directed toward the range floor.
9. Any person at any time is authorized to declare “Cease Fire” for an actual or anticipated safety issue. Upon “Cease Fire” all firing is to stop immediately.
10. All firearms must remain unloaded with actions open or holstered when not in use. Note: some competitive events may have additional more restrictive rules for transporting/carrying firearms. Contact a match official before removing any firearms from your vehicle (including open/concealed carry).
11. Explosives, explosive targets, armor piercing, incendiary or tracer rounds are prohibited on this range.
12. Handguns, rifles, and shotguns are permitted in these shooting bays. Please pick up hulls/brass.
13. Target stands are not to be removed from the shooting bays.
14. You may bring your own steel targets. Steel should be a minimum of 7 yards for handgun caliber firearms or shotguns. No bottleneck rifle cartridges (such as 223, 308, 30-06, 7.62x39, or any equivalent cartridge) or shotgun slugs on steel targets in these bays. Please note Cowboy bays to the south may have different rules for steel targets.
15. Eye and ear protection is **REQUIRED** when on or near this range.
16. This is your club and a volunteer-operated facility – please clean-up range after each use! Please take cardboard targets directly to the dumpster.

REGULAR FIELD TARGET - LOCATION: ARCHERY RANGE

We shoot pellet guns from 10 to 55 yards. Using 12 and 20 FPE (foot pounds of energy). You shoot at different shapes plates with a Kill Zone hole. Hitting the KZ knocks over the target for a point!

XFT FIELD TARGET (XTREME FIELD TARGET) - LOCATION: SMALLBORE/AIRGUN RANGE

Shooting is simple to understand but a little challenging. It is very similar to the regular Field Target "Hunter Class". But with more POWER! It is a lot of FUN and a great bunch of shooters that want and will help in any way they can. What we shoot is PELLET guns from 20 to 100 yards. The targets are plates with kill zone holes, like Field Target. You must hit the kill zone to knock it over for a score. The caliber limit is .30 with no more than 100 FPE (foot pounds of energy).

N50 (NATIONAL 50) BENCHREST - LOCATION: SMALLBORE/AIRGUN RANGE

We shoot this at 50 yards with pellet guns, slugs and .22 Rimfire. We have concrete benches on the firing line that are very stable! Check out www.national50.org/rules for the rules and find out what it is all about!

INTRODUCTION

Air Rifle Silhouette competition is a new discipline which started in June 2023, with nine monthly matches in 2024 which included a championship match in August. These monthly matches are shot on the silhouette range on the 3rd Saturday of each month, March through November.

Small-bore guns, .22-.25 & .30 caliber are shot on steel silhouette targets from 25 to 100 yards. Big-bore guns, .308-.357-.45 & .50 caliber are shot from 50 meters to 200 meters.

AIR Pistol Silhouette competition monthly matches are shot in the Main Clubhouse on the 2nd Tuesday of each month starting at 5:00 PM, year-round.

If you do not have an AIR pistol, we have guns you can shoot in the match before you decide to buy. Classes are set up for both open sight and scopes. The pistol area is sanctioned by HPHMS which sanctions our .22 rimfire and center fire pistols on the silhouette range.

All in all it is a fun shooting sport for all ages. After watching, I'm sure you will get involved too! In this sport you don't shoot holes in paper, you shoot at steel animals and when hit they fall over:

- chickens 10 yds
- pigs 12-1/2 yds
- turkeys 15 yds
- rams 18 yds



The targets are in steel cabinets with sand traps in the bottom. The shooter immediately sees something happen. Entry fee for juniors is only \$1.00, \$5.00 for adults. Juniors shoot free with an adult entry.

INTRODUCTION

The Archery Complex has been redesigned with input from OKC Gun Club members to invite all types of shooters from Novice to Expert. We encourage you and your entire family to come out and experience the available ranges. Whether you are a hunter, a competitive 3D shooter, a long-time target shooter, recreational shooter, or are new to the sport, the Archery Division has a range for you.

The Archery Division will be providing events for members and the public at certain times during the year.

RANGE 1: (Novice or Beginner Area), six lanes of shorter distance bag targets ranging from 10-15 yards. Also available is a movable bag target for kids just getting started. In addition, there are four 3D standing targets. Restrooms, and a picnic area with refrigerator and cooking range under a covered pavilion, are available year-round making for a great family outing.

RANGE 2: (Multi-Purpose Field Tip/Broadhead Shooting), includes four covered shooting bays with 16 lanes, bow hangers, ground based arrow quivers, moveable tables, benches and chairs. The range offers Long-Range shooting at 50-100yd bag targets (Crossbow shooters are asked to shoot only long-range targets or are encouraged to bring their own), 12 Mid-Range 20-40yd bag targets, 3 Mid-Range Broadhead 20-40yds (Red Colored Stands/Block targets. 4 long range 3D targets (55-90yds), and a unique rolling moveable target for shooters to place as desired. In addition, a tower platform with 4 covered shooting bays provides a unique tree stand environment. The tower platform is also the home of the ATEUP Lounge, complete with tables, chairs, and a great view for relaxing after a good shoot.

RANGE 3: (3D Traditional Bow Shooters Only Practice Area), includes 6-8 3D targets at shooting distances from 10-30 yds.

RANGE 4: (The Gary England Memorial Range) 10-12 lanes of 3D walk-out targets with an assortment of targets standing at distances from 15-50 yds.

RANGE 5: (The Jim Yancy Memorial Range) 10-12 lanes 3D walk-out targets with an assortment of targets standing at distances from 15-50 yds.

Range 6: (The Champions Range) designed by our own OKC Gun Club Archery Match Directors and Archery Team, is a Tournament Only 3D 30 target walk-out course.

Youth Archery Try Before You Buy Program:

The Archery Division is now offering a new program to youth of gun club members. Youth bows may be checked out for 30 days, giving our young shooters the ability to try the sport of archery. Check outs are by appointment only.

Archery Safety:

Safety is our primary concern as we have taken steps to provide a safe shooting environment but always look to our shooters to demonstrate care when shooting. We ask that you make sure of your target as to what you are shooting and to know what is behind the target. Pay extra attention to signage, bow hangers, bench rest for bows, provided quivers, orange cones/flags indicating shooters are down range, and if needed “call-outs” to ensure no one is down range. Make sure that all children are behind the current shooters and are minding all rules and regulations. Benches, chairs, and tables are provided to be used for bow adjustments and sighting needs.

Equipment needed:

Shoot what you have (Traditional, Compound, Cross), as we welcome all types, styles, and levels of shooters. The Archery Division does not provide equipment, repair work, or instruction, but can make recommendations on how these services can be provided.

Events:

The Archery Division will be providing events for members and the public at certain times during the year. Events will be promoted via an email blast and the club calendar.

We always have our covered and lighted pavilion available to use which includes two picnic benches, outdoor grill, restrooms, and electricity.



Archery Range - Air Gun Range - RULES

1. Read and obey range rules while using this range. You are responsible for knowing these rules! Contact club official at Archery@OKCGunclub.org if clarification is needed or to report maintenance issues
2. Make sure of the target you are shooting at and what is behind your target.
3. Do not shoot arrows across lanes.
4. Hang bows on bow hooks or benchrest prior to going down range. This lets others know someone is down range.
5. Field points only on all Bag and 3D (animal shaped) targets.
6. Broadhead arrows used only on RED targets.
7. Air guns may only be used on metal targets, never shoot bag or 3D targets.
8. When two or more people are utilizing a range, one must act as Range Safety Officer.
9. NEVER handle air gun or bow while someone is downrange. Before anyone goes down range the Range Safety Officer must declare "Cease Fire – Range is Closed" and all air rifles/crossbows MUST be unloaded (action open or de-cocked) and placed on a rack or hook. Range Safety Officer shall verify all persons have returned before declaring "Range is Open". Usage of empty chamber flags is highly encouraged in air guns.
10. Any person at any time is authorized to declare "Cease Fire" for an actual or anticipated safety issue. Upon "Cease Fire" all firing is to stop immediately.
11. Always carry air guns UNLOADED. Only load air guns when pointed down range. When not engaging targets muzzle must be pointed straight up or straight down.
12. No high-powered air rifles allowed. No more than 20 Foot Pounds of energy allowed.
13. During a match, all ranges are closed (except Range 1) until match is complete. Check Club Calendar for dates and times.
14. This is your club and a volunteer-operated facility– please clean-up range after each use!

INTRODUCTION

The Benchrest Range is open to all for independent free style use for members and guests except for scheduled matches and times that are reserved for specific uses such as the military (Guard and Reserves) and the Oklahoma City Police Department (Sniper Team) training to accomplish their Homeland Security commitment. The Benchrest Range distances include 25 yds, 50 yds, 100 yds, 150 yds, 200 yds, and 300 yds.

All scheduled matches are “open matches”. Be sure to check the Gun Club Calendar, www.OKCgunclub.org, for dates and times. Be prepared to post your targets as soon as you arrive so you can go down range as soon as it opens. Bring a spotting scope to see your target so you do not slow down other shooters.

Rules for use of the range are posted at the range; be sure to review them. **NOTE: The Benchrest Range has posted a slug-only rule for shotguns! If you want to pattern your shotgun, there are facilities available at the Shotgun Range!**

Restrooms are located at the southeast corner of the scoring building. There is no reason to not bring the entire family to the range.

 - **ALWAYS** keep your finger off the trigger until you are ready to fire
 - **ALWAYS** keep your firearm unloaded until ready to use
3. When two or more people are utilizing this range, one must act as Range Safety Officer.
4. NEVER handle Firearm while someone is downrange. Before anyone goes down range the Range Safety Officer must declare "Cease Fire – Range is Closed" and all firearms MUST be **unloaded (magazine removed and bolt/action open) and** removed from the shooting benches and placed into a gun rack. Range Safety Officer shall verify all persons have returned before declaring "Range is Open". **Usage of empty chamber flags is highly encouraged.**
5. All firearms shall be transported in a bag/case or with the muzzle straight up or straight down to and from the shooting bench or gun rack. DO NOT POINT ANY FIREARMS AT ANYONE ELSE ON THE RANGE AT ANY TIME. The only place you may handle your firearm is on the shooting bench while the firearm is pointed downrange.
6. Do not load your firearm until you are seated at the bench and the muzzle is pointed at the targets.
7. All shooting must be done from established firing line – No shooting forward of the benches except for approved and sanctioned events.
8. All rounds must impact the earthen berms – no firing shall ever be directed toward side berm, or the range floor.
9. Any person at any time is authorized to declare "Cease Fire" for an actual or anticipated safety issue. Upon "Cease Fire" all firing is to stop immediately.
10. All firearms must remain unloaded with actions open and reasonably visible when not in use.
11. Explosives, explosive targets, armor piercing, incendiary or tracer rounds are prohibited on this range.
12. Only shotguns firing slugs may be used on this range. If you need to pattern bird shot, please go to the shotgun range.
13. No makeshift targets are to be placed on the ground – no cans, bottles, etc.
14. Eye and ear protection is REQUIRED when on or near this range.
15. This is your club and a volunteer-operated facility – please clean-up range after each use!
16. Steel Targets: Only steel targets provided by the club will be shot on this range. No personal steel targets authorized.
17. Prone shooting at East Benchrest is permitted provided the following rules are followed:
 - Shooter sets up "Road Closed" sign, found at Bench 1, on the road entrance to the target line.
 - No entrance to the target line is permitted until all firearms are in the provided racks.
 - Prone shooter removes sign from road entrance after shooting and returns it to Bench 1.
 - All Range Rules are followed.

INTRODUCTION

The Range was built primarily for NRA Bullseye pistol competitions. If you are unfamiliar with this type of shooting you can come out and get a work day in by serving as a Line Safety Officer and at the same time see how the Match is run. Also through out the year we will have classes for new shooters to the Bullseye shooting discipline. Classes are FREE and open to both Gun Club members and the public. Bring a friend. 3. **NEVER** handle firearm while someone is downrange.
4. Eye and ear protection is **REQUIRED** when on or near this range.
5. All shooting must be from established firing line - No shooting forward of the bench except for approved and sanctioned events.
6. All rounds must impact the rear earthen berm - no firing shall ever be directed towards the side berm or wall or the range floor. No targets shall be placed on or near the ground. Use a target stand.
7. When two or more people are utilizing this range, one must act as Range Safety Officer.
8. Any person at any time is authorized to declare "Cease Fire" for an actual or anticipated safety issue. Upon "Cease Fire," all firing is to stop immediately.
9. Only handguns are permitted to be used on this range except for approved and sanctioned events. Handguns firing centerfire rifle cartridges (such as .223) are prohibited.
10. All firearms must remain unloaded with actions open and reasonably visible when not in use.
11. Explosives, explosive targets, armor piercing, incendiary or tracer rounds are prohibited on this range.
12. The turning target mechanism (located in trench) is for sanctioned event/training use only.
13. No makeshift targets are to be placed on the ground - no cans, bottles, etc.
14. Members may bring their own targets / target frames and steel targets. (Steel must be 7 yards or more from firing line and high enough that misses impact the rear berm).
15. Club target frames shall not be removed from the range. Members should bring their own sticks and targets.
16. This is your club and a volunteer-operated facility!

INTRODUCTION

The sport of Cowboy Action Shooting provides a great opportunity for the entire family to participate and compete in a shooting sport. The Cowboy Action Division is recognized by the Single Action Shooting Society (SASS) as The Territorial Marshals. Cowboy Action Matches are held on the 2nd Saturday and the 4th Sunday of every month, year-round. Monthly match attendance is regularly more than 100 shooters.

ANNUAL MATCHES

In addition to hosting two matches per month, we also host Land Run, The SASS National Championship which is the largest Cowboy Action Shooting match in the world. We had more than 700 shooters from 47 states compete in 2025. The success of this match can be attributed to countless hours of volunteer's efforts.

COWBOY ACTION SHOOTING

Cowboy Action Shooting is a multifaceted shooting sport in which contestants compete with firearms typical of those used in the taming of the Old West; single action revolvers (calibers .32 to .45), lever action rifles (calibers .25 to .45 long colt), and side-by-side double barrel or pre-1899 pump or lever action shotguns (12, 16 or 20 gauge). One exception, children under 13 are referred to as a Buckaroo and are allowed to use .22s and 410s.

The shooting competition is staged in a unique OLD WEST style. Cowboy attire is required, which is anything from boots and jeans to clothing that personifies a specific western character. For beginners (long sleeved shirts and jeans will do - no tank tops, shorts or ball caps allowed). You will soon discover that part of the fun is the costume and of course the alias. All real Cowboy shooters have an alias (Oklahoma Gunslinger or Flat Top Okie) which should be associated with your costume. You can be a movie star and never have to go to Hollywood. With a variety of shooting categories, some based on shooting styles, some based on costuming, and some age or gender based, there will definitely be a shooting category for you. Cowboy Action Shooting is fast action, fantasy shooting competition.

INTRODUCTION

The OKC Gun Club is home of the nicest Known Distance ranges in this part of the country. The division is dedicated to the promotion of rifle marksmanship with a focus on competitive shooting ranging from 200 - 1,000 yards.

Competition within this division falls within three general categories:

- **Across the Course (XTC)** is based upon what is known as The National Match Course, shooters start out at the 200 yard line with the “slow fire” standing event, then shoot rapid fire sitting. After moving to the 300 yard line for a prone rapid fire event competitors move to the 600 yard line for the final event fired “slow fire”.
- **M1 Garand, Springfield, Vintage Rifle and Modern Military Rifle Matches (GSM)** are fired from the same positions as the XTC matches but all from the 200 yard line, a great way to get started!
- **Prone Matches** have two main flavors in the High Power Division: F-class and Sling. “F-class” is fired off of a rest or bipod or backpack at distances from 300 - 1,000 yards; **Sling** is fired at the same distances but with only the support of a shooting jacket and rifle sling.

Most of these events are sanctioned with the Civilian Marksmanship Program or The National Rifle Association of America. Local, State, and Regional matches are held throughout the year, and the National Mid-Range Matches are held here annually. A good place for a beginner to start is coming out to observing a match.



HIGH POWER RIFLE DIVISION, continued

ShotMarker Electronic Target System

The High Power Division uses ShotMarker electronic target systems for all matches and practice sessions. Now even while up to 1,000 yards away from the target, a shooter can instantly see hits on any handheld Apple or Android device. Its an exciting way to practice and shoot matches – the way of the future!



High Power Range Rules

1. Read and obey range rules while using this range. You are responsible for knowing these rules! Contact us at HIGHPower@OKCGUNCLUB.ORG if you have any questions.
2. If you have not completed a Highpower Safety Orientation, you will not use this range outside of sanctioned events. Safety orientations are provided after all matches.
3. Complete all range safety procedures prior to firing. (see posted range safety procedures)
4. Eye and hearing protection will be worn during live fire.
5. When two or more persons are using the range, one must act as the Safety Officer.
6. Any person at any time is authorized to declare a "Cease Fire" for an actual or anticipated safety issue. Upon "Cease Fire" all firing will immediately stop and rifles will be unloaded and made safe.
7. Target Requirements:
 - a. Conventional Targets (Located in the 600yd practice shed): Only target frames provided by the range will be utilized and targets must be well centered within the frames. Only paper targets are authorized. Target frames and targets are located in the target shed. The combination to the target shed is provided during the safety orientation.
 - b. Electronic Targets: Only target centers provided by the division will be used with electronic targets. Do not paste or staple anything over electronic target centers.
 - c. Steel Targets: Only steel targets provided by the club will be shot on this range. No personal steel targets authorized.
8. While on this range rifle actions will be opened, with Empty Chamber Indicator (ECI) in place, until safe to fire. You may obtain an ECI during the orientation or from a range official.
9. Muzzles must be forward of firing lines during live fire.
10. The Level Load Rule is mandatory: when loading, the rifle the rifle must be level or below the horizon during the loading process.
11. All rounds fired must impact either the 600yd berm or the 1000yd berm without exception.
12. No caliber in excess of .35 caliber allowed on the range.
13. No .223Rem/5.56x45 rounds lighter than 62gr may be shot beyond the 300yd line.
14. No 7.62x39 (AK type ammo) may be shot beyond the 200yd line.
15. Explosives, exploding targets, armor piercing, incendiary or tracer rounds are prohibited on this range.
16. No driving on any firing lines.
17. Police up your brass and trash before you leave the range.
18. Secure the range before leaving including flags and signs.
19. If you are unsure, DON'T!!

Range Use

The High Power range is intended primarily for practice and pursuit of the high power rifle marksmanship disciplines. Casual rifle shooting is permitted but rules must be observed. See Range Priority of Use

INTRODUCTION

The era for Historic 3-Gun (H3G) is from 1900 through WWII, with a focus on the 1915 era, allowing uniforms/clothing, and more importantly firearms from the period. H3G is true to the 3-Gun concept with high round counts and movement using iconic firearms from the early 1900's. It is not a fitness sport, nor is it bullseye competition. If you like USPSA or Wild Bunch, you'll love Historic 3-Gun.

SAFETY is the number one concern and SAFETY is the responsibility of every shooter.

SHOOTING OPPORTUNITIES

Staged H3G has 6 divisions (listed below) based on what guns you will shoot. All six of the divisions allow the 1911 pistol and a Winchester model 1887, 1897 or 1912. For other than the Bootlegger division, the rifle you shoot determines what division you are in. Each division competes only against itself, as there is no overall winner for the match.

We shoot in squads. Every member of the squad pitches in to help with spotting, timing, picking brass or score keeping. We welcome you to attend this incredibly fun and entertaining new shooting sport.

Stage scenarios incorporate lateral as well as down range movement, with action targets such as swinging plates, dueling trees, falling-plate racks, and clay bird poppers. Typical round count per stage are 21-28 pistol, 5-10 rifle, and 5-8 shotgun.

Another entertaining part of H3G is costuming and choosing an alias. During match events, the typical attire worn by participants is that late-19th-20th century Western/Mexican wear or military attire. An example would be Roosevelt's Rough Riders. Alias' can vary widely and can be based on historical figures, the style of dress you choose to portray a character, or even something personal to you. The choices for your costume and alias are endless.



HISTORIC 3-GUN DIVISION, continued

DIVISIONS

Traditional – Pistol must be a full size 1911 in 45 caliber, with fixed sights in the style of the original 1911 or 1911 A1 issued to the U.S. military. The pistol must be shot one-handed, unsupported. A lever or pump action rifle in a pistol caliber of .40 or larger is required. Any approved shotgun

Modern – Pistol shall be any approved model in 45 caliber. It may be shot one handed or two handed. A lever or pump action rifle, in a pistol caliber of .40 or larger is required. Any approved shotgun.

Doughboy – Any approved 1911 and shotgun. A mil spec bolt ac-on rifle issued by any country by the end of WWII is required. Rifles, or replicas, maintaining the original specifications that have been re-chambered to a different rifle caliber (i.e. 7.62x51) are allowed

Ranger - Any approved 1911 and shotgun are allowed. A lever action rifle in a rifle caliber originally manufactured by the end of WWI is required. Also allowed is a newer rifle that follows the design of an earlier rifle of the required era. (Marlins and Henrys are allowed.) The model 14/141 pump rifles are allowed. Rifle receiver or tang sights are allowed.

Audie Murphy - Any approved 1911 and shotgun. A U.S. M-1 carbine.

Bootlegger – This division allows a wide assortment of firearms. Using any or all of these puts a competitor into this division. Options include: 1. Pistol: All centerfire service pistols which were originally manufactured by the end of World War 2, including the 1911 45, P-38, Browning Hi-Power, Luger, Broom Handle Mauser, Colt 1902 hammer pocket model. 1911 38 Super/9mm, 1917 Colt, Smith or Webley with shaved cylinder using 45 ACP with full or half-moon clips. 2. Shotgun: All pump and lever action shotguns with wood furniture are allowed. Any legal barrel length in 12, 16 and 20-gauge are allowed. Magazine tube may be extended to the end of barrel. Period-correct external chokes are allowed. 3. Carbines: all pump action, lever action and semi-automatic in true pistol centerfire caliber originally manufactured by the end of WW2 are allowed. Wood furniture is required. Winchester 1905 S.L. 1907, if downloaded to 1550 fps or less and the Thompson carbine (SBR) allowed. Allowed includes registered full auto Thompson used in semi mode, the Suomi carbine, the M1 carbine in 9mm, and the Henry Homesteader 9mm, resembling a 1905/07 Winchester are allowed.

Age and Defined Categories: age-based categories in each division:

Deputy – 16 years and younger

Trooper – Any age

Marshal – 65 and older

HOW TO GET STARTED

Considering trying Historic 3 Gun, but don't have all or any of the required firearms? That's OK! Don't buy anything! Contact Tommy (aka Hondo Tweed) or JB (aka Elwood James) prior to a scheduled monthly match and they will get you outfitted with everything you need to give it a try. That way, you can decide what category you would like to participate in, and what firearms you would choose to acquire for competition. If you have historic weapon you want to shoot, we will figure out a way to incorporate it into one of our divisions. Bring the whole family for a day of fun.

INTRODUCTION

Pistol and Revolvers are all welcome to shoot with us in the club events. No magnums or 5.7.

If you want to shoot at some fun events in competition or just for life saving practice, this is the place! All shooting is done from stationary positions and under time limits. No moving and shooting involved.

Our goal is to have fun shooting accurately and fast.



The target is tomb stone shape rather than Man shape.

The center is a 4 inch black circle and counts as an X plus 10 points.

The next circle is 8 inch in diameter and counts as 10 points

After that is the 8 point ring and anything else on the target counts as 5 points.

THE EVENTS

The Mover: You think of a time and place where you might have to hit a moving target. Do you know how much lead you would have to take at a given distance to hit that target? Do you know how to calculate that lead? We can help. The Moving target comes from behind a barricade moving at 10 feet a second and is shot at 10, 15, 20, and 25 yards. At 10 and 15 yards, six shots each pass and at 15 and 25 yards three shots per pass.



The Barricades: Here is a another event we shoot. Here you can learn how to shoot from behind (barricades) at fast, presentation, tombstone shape targets. The tomb stone target is shot at 10, 15, 25 and 35 yards under time limits.



NRA ACTION PISTOL DIVISION, continued

The Steel Plates: At the steel plate event there are six 8 inch round steel plates spaced 12 inches apart. They are shot at 10, 15, 20, and 25 yards under varying time limits.



The Practical Event: At this event we shoot at the tomb stone target under time limits at 10, 15, 25 and 50 yards. At longer distances, some competitors go prone and shoot.

All four events consist of 48 rounds for a possible max score of 1920 with 192 x.



ABOUT THE NRA/CMP ACTION PISTOL DIVISION

The NRA/CMP Action Pistol division at the Oklahoma City Gun Club is open to all individuals interested in SAFE and FUN courses of fire, which combine ACCURACY and SPEED. The courses of fire in our events were designed after the events held at the Bianchi Cup match in Columbia, Missouri, a CMP National Championship event. The rules we use are NRA.

Practice and matches are open to the public. You do not need to be a member of the NRA, CMP or the Oklahoma City Gun Club to participate in our matches.

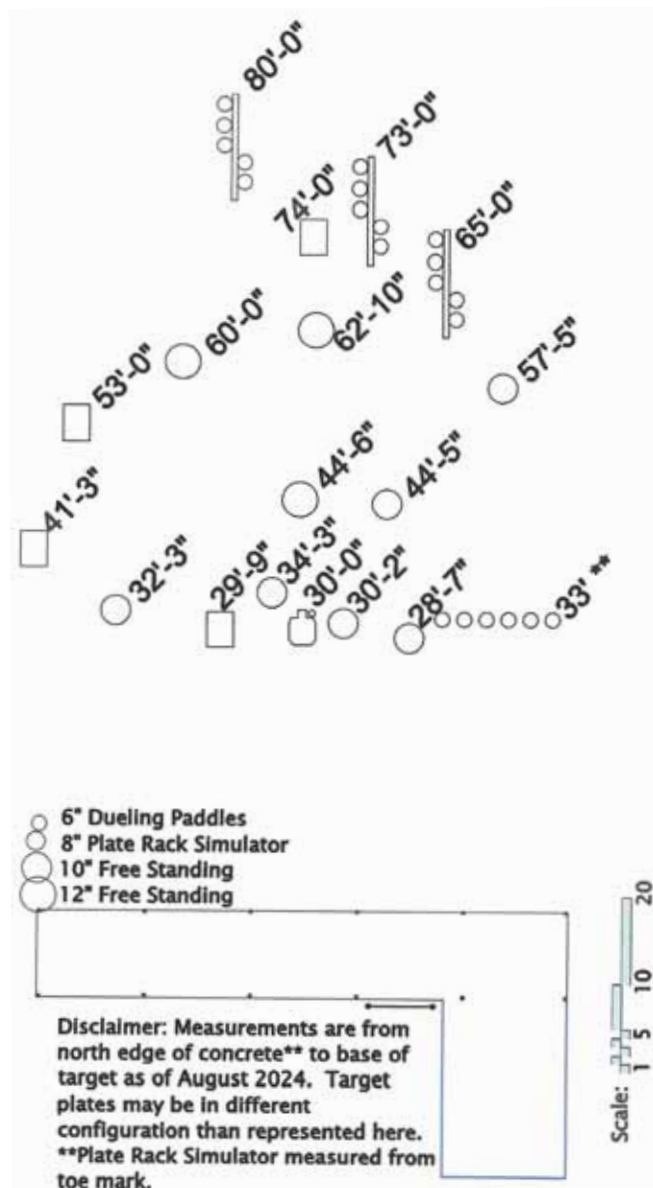

INTRODUCTION

The Plinking Division is an informal range designed for all types of handgun and pistol caliber carbine, rimfire to center-fire. Attention Plinking Range users: As constructed and as intended to be used, the Plinking Range is safe and all bullets are properly contained within the berm. It is very important that absolutely no additional targets be attached to the steel targets or placed directly on the ground. When the bullets impact the ground at such an angle they could ricochet and leave the bay. For safety reasons, all shots must impact the berm.

Please observe the posted rules for use of the Plinking Range and only engage the provided plate racks when using this range. Range Rules may be found on the following page. Please notify Marc McCormick or Tom Peace with questions or broken targets. Enjoy yourself and be safe!



Plinking Range - RULES

1. Read and obey range rules while using this range. You are responsible for knowing these rules! Contact us at plinking@okcgunclub.org.
2. Safety is paramount in all activities conducted on this range.
ALWAYS keep firearm pointed in a safe direction
ALWAYS keep your finger off the trigger until you are ready to fire
ALWAYS keep your firearm unloaded until ready to use
3. **NEVER** handle firearm if someone is downrange.
4. Eye and ear protection is **REQUIRED** when on or near this range.
5. All shooting must be from established firing line.
6. All rounds must impact the rear earthen berm - No targets shall be placed on or near the ground.
7. **Only targets provided are to be used, no homemade or improvised targets.**
8. When two or more people are utilizing this range, one must act as Range Safety Officer.
9. Any person at any time is authorized to declare "Cease Fire" for an actual or anticipated safety issue. Upon "Cease Fire," all firing is to stop immediately.
10. Only pistol caliber firearms are permitted to be used on this range. Firearms chambered in centerfire rifle cartridges (such as .223) are prohibited. Examples of pistol caliber cartridges are 9mm, 40 S&W, 45 ACP, 38 special, 44 magnum, 45 Colt. If you have questions about what cartridges are permitted or to report damaged targets, please contact us via email at plinking@okcgunclub.org.
11. All firearms must remain unloaded with actions open and reasonably visible when not in use.
12. Explosives, explosive targets, armor piercing, incendiary or tracer rounds are prohibited on this range.
13. This is your club and a volunteer-operated facility! Please clean-up range after each use!

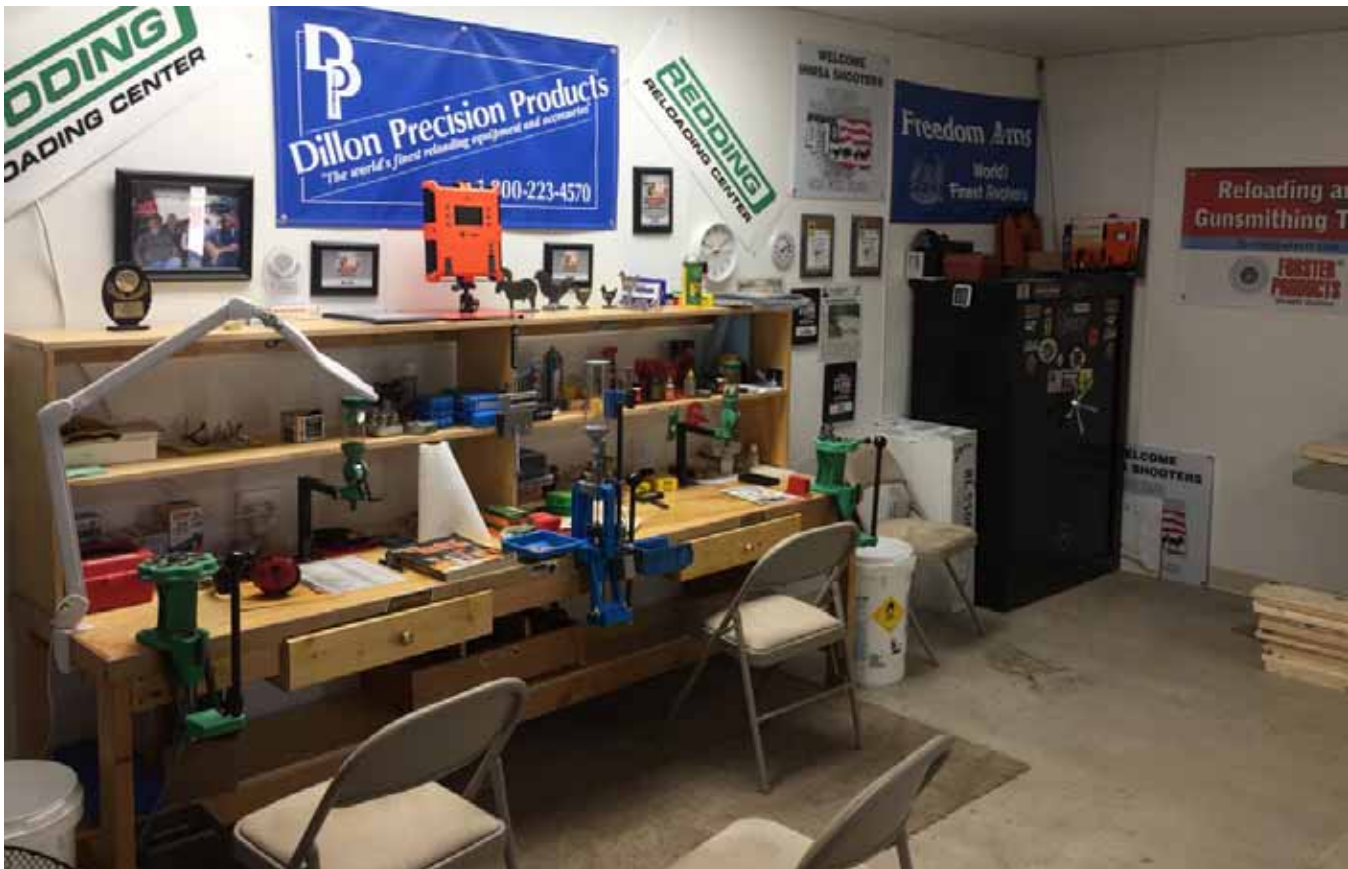

INTRODUCTION

Many of us begin our reloading endeavors through a friend or acquaintance in an informal setting without any formal structure often leaving the neophyte with more questions than answers. Enter the Oklahoma City Gun Club; the club leadership has established a Reloading Division which will meet in the reloading shack at the Silhouette Range! NRA certified reloading instructors will teach classes in metallic rifle and pistol reloading as well as shotshell reloading. These classes will be a combination of lecture and hands-on with students reloading several rounds of ammunition in class.

In addition, the facility will be open at different times to allow members who have graduated the reloading course to reload your own ammunition using club equipment under the watchful eye of experienced reloading instructors. INTRODUCTION

RANGE LOCATION, HOURS, AND GENERAL INFORMATION

The Shotgun Division ranges are located on the east side of the club property. Our gate is located one-quarter of a mile north of Sorghum Mill Road, on Hiwassee Road, on the left. Access thru the gate requires the combination from your badge followed by the #. We have 5 skeet fields, two of which overlay trap fields. Other facilities we offer include: a hand trap where you can bring your own targets; a pattern board to test your loads; a clubhouse with two restrooms and a kitchen; another building by fields #3 and #4 with two restrooms; a large pavilion with picnic tables and benches; and 22 camper spaces with electricity and water hook-ups.



GUNS AND EQUIPMENT

Any shotgun (pump action, semi-automatic, side-by-side, or over/under) capable of holding 2 shells (Never load more than 2 at any time on the range and only load when you are on station) can be used to shoot skeet or trap. Registered skeet targets are shot with the 12, 20, 28 gauge and .410 bore shotguns. Registered trap targets are normally shot with a 12-gauge shotgun. Eye and ear protection are a MUST while on the range either shooting, scoring or watching; and a vest or bag for carrying shells and empty hulls is needed. ONLY 7 ½ - 9 lead (no steel) shot is permitted on any skeet or trap field. Nothing larger! When carrying your shotgun from your vehicle to the fields, the action MUST BE OPEN to show it's a safe gun.

SKEET INFORMATION

Skeet is a shotgun sport in which a shooter fires at clay targets while progressing through 8 stations around a semi-circular field. The targets are thrown from a high house on the left, and a low house on the right, so they cross a point in the center of the field at a height of 15 feet.

TRAP INFORMATION

Trap is a shotgun sport in which the shooter fires at clay targets thrown from a single trap house, while the shooter stands on one of 5 stations graduated from 16 to 27 yards behind the trap house. It is normally shot with a 12 gauge gun. The guns most commonly used for trap are the semi-auto and over/under.

TRAP AND SKEET LEAGUES

Check the website and "Primer" for information regarding leagues. These are open to the public, and novice shooters are welcome. All shooters are assigned to a five person squad, and competes alongside another squad each week.

BEGINNER SKEET LESSONS

Beginner's skeet lessons are held usually one Saturday a month, at the Shotgun Clubhouse, from 9:00 AM until noon. Check the main gun club event calendar for dates. **Pre-registration is required** because class size is limited. To register please email shotgun@okcgunclub.org. The cost is \$40.00 which includes targets. The lesson plan will cover gun safety, gun fit, basic skeet fundamentals, and skeet etiquette. Participants will need to bring:

- 4 boxes of target load shells. No. 7 1/2-9 shot (Lead shot only - NO steel shot)
- Eye protection
- Ear protection
- A ball cap or visor and a shell bag to hold your ammo

REGISTERED SKEET AND TRAP

The Oklahoma City Gun Club is proud to host numerous registered skeet and trap tournaments throughout the year, which are officially sanctioned by the National Skeet Shooting Association (NSSA) and the American Trap Association (ATA). Participation in these shoots requires current membership in the NSSA and the OSSA (Oklahoma Skeet Shooting Association) for skeet, as well as ATA and OTA (Oklahoma Trap Association) for trap. All shooters must present a valid membership card and current classification card for entry into the shoots.

5-STAND

Our newly completed 5-Stand Field is located directly South and West of the Muzzleloader Range. 5-Stand is very similar to Sporting Clays in that a wide variety of targets are thrown. No two 5-stands are exactly alike. There are five "stands" or stations to shoot from. There are usually somewhere between 6 and 8 traps that throw targets. Participants shoot in turn at each of the 5 stands and various combinations of targets are thrown from the traps. There is a menu card that will advise the shooter of the sequence of targets. 5-Stand is a great way to get a Sporting Clays like experience in a small amount of space, with very little walking.

We will begin shooting from 12:30 PM - 3:00 PM on the 3rd Sunday of the month. The cost is \$8.00 a round. Five people can shoot at a time and you will be squadded on a first come first serve basis. We are excited to get this shooting discipline off the ground and running. Whether you are an experienced shooter or a beginner, 5-Stand provides you an opportunity to dust off that shotgun and try something new at the Oklahoma City Gun Club.

MEMBER RESPONSIBILITIES

This is a volunteer-run club, so each person shooting on the shotgun range is responsible for signing in before shooting and cleaning up the range when finished shooting which includes: picking up empty hulls, rolling up the cords and putting them in the low house, de-cocking the machines and loading them, and flattening empty target boxes and putting them in the incinerator. Targets are paid for using the Briley system on each field. Tokens and/or Smart cards can be purchased on Saturday's from 10am until noon. There is also a token machine located by the sign in board. Instructions for using the Briley boxes are located on the shotgun web page.

CHILDREN AND SPOUSES

Feel free to bring your family. Young shooters are always welcome, and may shoot as long as they are big enough to handle the gun and know gun safety. As a member, you will be expected to shoot with or accompany any shooter under 16, as well as any guest you bring to the range.

SHOTGUN EXTENDED ACCESS

All skeet and trap fields are honor's fields and may be used by members out of our regular hours. Before a member receives honor's field privileges for the skeet/trap fields, he/she must: attend a safety orientation class. This class will be offered periodically, instructions for signing up will be emailed to the membership.

INTRODUCTION

The AR Steel Plate Challenge match takes place March through September on the last Saturday of each month at 8:30 AM on the Silhouette range. As always, with any match on our range, be sure to check event calendar on our web page at www.okcgunclub.org for any date changes.

This match is for the average club member to have fun with his or her AR-15 & the main rules are, as stated below is safety both while on the line or behind the line. You do not have to be a club member to shoot this match, so you can bring a guest. Safety chamber flags are a must & are provided. Bring your own eye & ear protection.

If you plan on shooting all three events, (20 rounds each) including practice rounds you will need 85-to-100 rounds.

Any calibers on the AR platform are legal. No magnum rifle calibers are allowed on the silhouette range.

You are allowed practice rounds before each event before shooting for score.

The steel plates are left up on the range at all times at all distances so club members can practice on off-match dates, just be sure that you do not shoot at any silhouette targets while using the silhouette range. Range rules are posted above the sign-in box left of the silhouette clubhouse door.

You are required to sign-in anytime you use the silhouette range facility. Contact Division Director above, if you have any questions.

SAFETY

1. Safety is the number one concern while competing in this match.
2. Eye and ear protection is required to compete in this match.
3. Upon completion of your course of Fire, and Before Leaving Your Shooting Position, Magazines Out, Safety Flags in Chamber. We provide safety flags.
4. No Armor-Piercing Bullets Allowed on the Silhouette Range, regular FMJ OK.
5. Do Not Shoot at Any Silhouette Targets Either During the Match or While Practicing on This Range. Shoot at Swinging Steel Plates Only!!!!
6. Pick Up Your Brass Immediately After Completing Course of Fire. We provide a brass catcher.

MATCH FORMAT

1. This is a 20-Round Match - Five (5) Shots Are Fired on Steel Plates at Each Distance. Club members as well as non-club members may shoot in this match.
2. There are three courses of fire, with 5 shots fired on steel plates at each distance for a total of 20 rounds on each course (1) SHORT COURSE - 100 meters, 150 meters and 300 meters. (2) LONG COURSE - 200 meters, 300 meters, 400 meters & 500 meters. (3) SPEED EVENT - 20 rounds shot on the short course of fire, within a one minute, (60 second) time frame. All ties will be shot off.
3. Entry Fees Are \$10.00 Per Entry There is no additional charge if you shoot the 20-round speed event providing you shoot both the short range course and long range course. You May Shoot a Re-entry for \$5.00 After Everyone Has Completed Their Course of Fire, But This Score is Not Counted in the Match. Please Mark Re-entry on Your Scorecard.
4. You Shoot Off a Bench With Supplied Front Rest or if You Prefer & Your Rifle Is Equipped With a bi-Pod You May Use It. You may also shoot in the prone position on a shooting mat if you like. Brass catchers are provided.
5. You Are Allowed a Spotter to Score Your Hits - X=Hit 0=Miss
6. This is a Elapsed Time Event Your Time For 20-Rounds Will Be Recorded by a Designated Person With a Very Accurate PACT Timer
7. Please Note; Tie scores Will Be Broken by Shooters Total Elapsed Time and Score. Example: Two Shooters Tie with a score of 15x20, Shortest Elapsed Time Determines the Winner. If a Tie Still Remains, a Shoot-off Will Then Take Place Between Competitors. NOTE: You Have a Limit of Four (4) Minutes to Fire Twenty (20) Rounds; Any Late Shot Will Not Count.
8. Sign Your Score card After Completing Your Course of Fire, Once You Sign it, You Are Responsible For Any Mistakes.
9. If Your Gun Malfunctions During Course of Fire and You Can't Resolve the Problem Within a Reasonable Amount Time, Safety Flag in, Magazine Out!!!
10. Make Sure You Fill Out Your Score-Card Correctly From Top to Bottom
11. This Match is Designed to Have Fun With Your AR, So Please Abide by the Rules Set Forth, So We Can Continue Shooting This Match. We Will Shoot the Last Saturday of Each Month, March thru November, Starting at 8:30 AM you may go to our website, www.OKCgunclub.org and check the event calendar for exact dates.
12. A new event will be a 20-round speed event where you will have one minute to fire 20 rounds on steel plates from 300 meters, back to 100 meters; 5 rounds on each plate. There is no charge for this match providing you have paid for the two other matches.

INTRODUCTION

We welcome anyone wanting to shoot High Plains Handgun Metallic Silhouette (HPHMS) at the OKC Gun Club. If you have not shot this before then your first time is FREE!!! Don't be discouraged if you do not have one of the specialty guns. Just bring what you have. Many Gun Club members will be happy to let you use their gun and even provide assistance and ammo. Every member encourages you and wants you to do well. So come on out and bring a friend. You will wonder why you never tried it sooner. The Silhouette Range at the Gun Club utilizes a new remote controlled auto target reset system.

WHAT IS HPHMS?

INTRODUCTION

As part of the Silhouette Division, this match is an NRA approved match and is conducted on the third Saturday of the month, March thru November, at the Silhouette Range. The rifles used are the traditional type in use during the 1870-1900 time period - strictly black powder and lead alloy bullets. No gas checks or jacketed bullets allowed. The only black powder substitute allowed is Pyrodex.

Rifles common to the era are: the 1874-1875 Sharps, 1885 Winchester, Remington Rolling-Blocks, and Stevens 44,1-1/2. There are many more rifles, too many to list here, suitable for this type shooting. Modern reproductions are acceptable.

Calibers most commonly in use are the .40-65 Winchester and the .45-70 Winchester. You will also see the .38-55 Winchester, .38-50 Remington Hepburn, .40-70 Sharps Straight, and the .45-90 Winchester.

Normally, sighting equipment consists of a tang mounted vernier rear and a globe type front sight using interchangeable inserts. Apertures or post are the most common.

There is also a scope category. Scopes are of the traditional style in use during the 1860-1900 time frame. There are three (3) or four (4) brands available. Oklahoma City Gun Club member Dan Zimmerman of DZ Arms produces world renowned scopes and BPCR rifles.

The targets are of steel plate, cut to resemble full sized animals:

- The 200M target is a silhouette of a Chicken. Shot in the standing position.
- The Pig is positioned at 300M and shot from the sitting or prone position using crossed sticks.
- The Turkey is at 385M.
- The Ram is at 500M. Again, shot from the sitting or prone position using crossed sticks.

Ten (10) shots for score at each animal at each of the four (4) distances. Unlimited sighters shots are allowed for each animal prior to going for score. Keeping in mind you will have a seven (7) minute time limit for the first five (5) shots for record. The second five (5) shots for record will have a five (5) minute time limit, and sighters are not allowed. Approximately sixty (60) rounds are required for a complete match.

This is a highly competitive and highly rewarding sport. Using the equipment and the basic technology available to the shooter and hunter of the late 1800s to hit the steel animal sized targets from 200M out to 500M distances.

In addition to personal defense and situational awareness, we offer advanced classes, along with special discipline classes that are all conducted by local and nationally recognized instructors. Some of the classes the Training Division offers are listed below:

- NRA Certification classes in Shotgun, Rifle, and Pistol
- NRA Instructor Certification classes in Shotgun, Rifle, and Pistol
- Concealed Carry Classes (Oklahoma Self-Defense Act)
- Home Defense Shotgun/Carbine Classes
- Basic Handgun Classes
- Basic Holster Skill Classes
- NRA Personal Protection in/outside of the Home
- NRA Range Safety Officer Certification
- NRA Chief Range Safety Officer Certification

Additionally, the Training Division schedules Scouting America Troops each year for their shotgun and rifle merit badge certification and many Civil Air Patrol Cadets camp to shoot rifles and shotguns.

LADIES PISTOL LEAGUE

The Training Division hosts the OKCGC Ladies Pistol League that meets twice a month and is open to women of all experience levels. The goal of this league is to introduce women to the shooting sports in a safe, yet fun environment. Their training events include information on topics related to firearm safety, maintenance, range gear, holster basics and skills, marksmanship skills for speed, accuracy, and competitive shooting. They also hold lectures on situational awareness & training on less lethal options for self-protection and much more. In 2022, the Ladies Pistol League played an integral part in breaking a 31-year record with the Glock Sport Shooting Foundation (GSSF) for having the most women to ever participate in an outdoor GSSF match. The league trained, and recruited women from all over the US. By the time it was all said and done, they had 55 women in the Glock Girls division. Since that time, Jamie Meyer, the Director of the Ladies Pistol League, has become the Match Director for the OK State GSSF Match (Red Dirt Shootout) that is hosted at the club each year in October. RETIRED LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER SAFETY ACT (LEOSA) FIREARMS QUALIFICATIONS

HR 218/Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act (LEOSA) provides for qualified retired law enforcement officers (LEO) to carry concealed firearms provided they meet the standards for firearms training every 12 months. The Training Division has several certified CLEET firearms instructors who can conduct the firearms qualification. We do this as a community service for our retired Law Enforcement Officers. Contact the Training Division for further information.

TRAINING DIVISION RANGE

The Training Range is open to all Gun Club members to shoot .22 LR pistols and rifles. Always check the Gun Club calendar for scheduled events when the Training Range is in use.

Training Division Range - RULES

1. Read and obey range rules while using this range. You are responsible for knowing these rules! Contact a club official if you need clarification.
2. Safety is paramount in all activities conducted on this range.
ALWAYS keep firearm pointed in a safe direction
ALWAYS keep your finger off the trigger until you are ready to fire
ALWAYS keep your firearm unloaded until ready to use
3. **NEVER** handle firearm while someone is downrange.
4. Eye and ear protection is **REQUIRED** when on or near this range.
5. This range is for .22 rimfire handguns and rifles only. **DO NOT** use centerfire handguns, centerfire rifles, or shotguns on this range except for approved and sanctioned events.
6. All shooting must be from an established firing line. **DO NOT** go forward of the concrete pad (into the grass) for shooting except for approved and sanctioned events.
7. All rounds must impact the rear earthen berm – **DO NOT** fire at the two side berms, the range floor, or over the rear berm.
8. When two or more people are using this range, one must act as the Range Safety Officer.
9. Any person at any time is authorized to declare "Cease Fire" for an actual or anticipated issue. Upon "Cease Fire", all firing is to stop immediately.
10. All firearms must remain unloaded with action open and reasonably visible when not in use.
11. **DO NOT** use explosives, explosive targets, armor piercing, incendiary, or tracers on this range.
12. **DO NOT** use makeshift targets placed on the ground – no cans, bottles, etc.
13. Members may bring their own targets/target frames and steel targets. (Steel targets must be 10 yards or more from the firing line). Targets need to be high enough that misses impact the rear berm.
14. **DO NOT** remove the club target stands from the range. Members should bring their own sticks and targets.
15. This is your club and volunteer-operated facility! Please put target stands back on concrete pad, clean up brass and trash after each use.

INTRODUCTION

Wild Bunch Action Shooting is a fun and exciting shooting sport that combines action, speed, and accuracy, in which the entire family can participate and compete. Matches are hosted at the Cowboy Action Range each month. Wild Bunch Action Shooting offers the following categories. The two basic categories offered are Modern and Traditional. These two categories are open categories and can be shot by men and women. At the match director's discretion, all categories may be further divided into Ladies categories (Ladies categories are restricted to biological (at birth) females only), and Senior categories (Senior category is 65 years of age and older).

WILD BUNCH ACTION SHOOTING

Staged in the turn of the 20th century when the west was still wild, Wild Bunch Action Shooting is a 3-Gun shooting sport that utilizes classic firearms such as the .45 ACP 1911 pistol, lever-action rifles chambered in pistol calibers and any SASS legal shotgun. Typical rounds per stage are 21-28 pistol, 7-10 rifle, and 5-6 shotgun.

Currently, SASS-sanctioned Wild Bunch matches such as state, regional, national, and world championships have two shooting categories to choose from. The "Traditional" category utilizes an original-design M1911/M1911A1 pistol, and the participant must use a traditional one-handed grip. The "Modern" category utilizes either an original-design M1911/M1911A1 pistol or a modern-style 1911 pistol and the participant may use either a traditional one-handed or a modern two-handed grip.

Another entertaining part of Wild Bunch Action Shooting for many participants is costuming and choosing an alias. During match events, the typical attire worn by participants is that of early-20th century military, late-19th to early-20th century western (such as that worn in the film *The Wild Bunch*), Roosevelt's "Rough Riders", or Mexican period clothing. However, men's modern western attire such as boots, jeans, long-sleeve western shirts, and cowboy hats while women's western attire such as boots and jeans/dresses are also common. Alias' can vary widely. They can be based upon your style of dress, a character you're portraying, or even something personal to you such as a family name. The choices for costuming and alias' are endless!

INTRODUCTION

In December 1999, the Board of Directors of the Oklahoma City Gun Club unanimously approved the formation of Women's Division. Coincidentally, during the same month, the NRA created the Women on Target (WOT) program aimed at providing opportunities for women in shooting. Together they formed a partnership in organizing the First Annual Women on Target Instructional Shooting Clinic on September 8, 2000. Grants were applied for and funded to the newly formed Women's Division by the NRA Foundation via the Heartland Friends of the NRA and the Women on Target program of the NRA.

Fifty-seven women attended the inaugural shoot in 2000 and registration in 2018 was over 600 registrants. As a result, Oklahoma City Gun Club has hosted the nation's largest instructional shooting clinic for women for the past 25 years. The WOT Instructional Shooting Clinic has continued to grow and be successful through the efforts of members of the Oklahoma City Gun Club, volunteers from the Oklahoma County Sheriff's Department, Oklahoma Highway Patrol, Midwest City Police Department, Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation, and the Women's Division.

The Women's Division charter members are Suzi Rouse, Joann Burner, Susan Cusack, Sharon Conrady, Pam Green, Sandy Payne, Dawn Taylor, Diana Hannah, Kansas Conrady, and Suzanne Black. These ten women became NRA certified instructors in pistol, shotgun, rifle and range officer disciplines through funding and support of the WOT program. Their backgrounds varied from a homemaker to a FBI Agent. They all had one focus and that was to provide an opportunity to share various shooting sports and firearms safety to women who have an interest. The current members of the women's division include the ladies listed above, in addition to Paula Tate, Jana Butcher, Cathy Canary, Tina White, Jackie Legg, Julie Rutledge, Carey Pribil, Marilyn Dye, Tracey McKey, and many other ladies who donate their time and expertise.

We have women that come from all over Oklahoma and as far away as Texas, Arkansas, Kansas, Nebraska, California, and Florida. Women from all walks of life participate in this event and we encourage anyone who has an interest in participating to sign up for a fun filled day of firearms safety and actual range time with a 22 rifle, various calibers of pistols, 20 gauge shotguns and AR-15 rifles. Companies such as Benelli, Glock, Smith & Wesson, DPMS, Inc., Ceasar Guerini, Blaser USA, Federal Premium Ammunition, along with Cabelas sponsor this event and provide firearms for the day.
